JUDGE REPRIMANDS POLICE.

Criticises Arrest of Woman Who Wore Bathing Suit Under Skirt.

Magistrate Geismar, in the Coney Island Court, yesterday reprimanded the police for arresting an alleged violator of the park ordinance forbidding persons to walk along Ocean Parkway in other than complete street attire.

The Magistrate made his ruling in the case of Mrs. Anna Goldman of 443 Neptune Avenue, against whom an additional charge of disorderly conduct was made. Her husband, William, and Nicholas Christy, of the same address, were charged with disorderly conduct. The three were arrested by Patrolmen Simmons and Papp after the police had ordered Mrs. Goldman to return home because she had a bathing suit under a sweater and a skirt. The men remonstrated against the order. It was alleged the policemen raised the woman's skirt to see if she had on a bathing suit.

"You had no business to see if she had on a bathing suit," said the Magistrate. "If she did have a bathing suit under her sweater and skirt, she had a right to go anywhere she pleased. If
