

Chicago Bans Film Exposing Situation Under Hitler's Rule

New York, Jan. 18. (U.P.).—Time, Inc., tonight said the Chicago Board of Censors has banned the showing of the latest March of Time news-reel, "Inside Nazi Germany, 1938."

Earlier today Dr. Jans Borchers, German consul-general here, denied his office had sought elimination of some scenes.

Time, Inc., said that the Chicago ban was on the grounds that the film is unfriendly to the German government. The ban will be appealed.

Louis De Rochemont, producer, said he received requests for elimination of scenes from German Vice Consul Dr. Georg F. Krause-Wichmann, who saw the film at a preview yesterday, and from Fritz Kuhn, president of the German-American Bund. "If Hitler sees this picture I'm ruined," de Rochemont quoted Kuhn.

Protestant Preacher Faces Nazi Trial Feb. 7

Berlin, Jan. 18 (AP).—A district court today set February 7 as date for the trial of the Rev. Martin Niemoeller, Protestant leader in the fight against Nazi government regulation of church affairs.

Niemoeller has been in jail since July 1. He was offered his freedom if he would agree to quit preaching, but he insisted upon a trial.
